Recipe:

'Pacific Champ' a kiwi twist on an Irish classic




In Ireland mashed potato with lots of butter and some green onion (sometimes garlic) is called champ or colcannon. Below is my own variation. I tried it and gave it a big tick, so thought I would share it with you.

Ingredients:

- 2 large potatoes
- 1 orange kumara, peeled and chopped into chunks
- 100gm butter
- 1 small (165 ml) can of coconut cream
- a small handful of chives, snipped finely with scissors, or the green ends of a couple of spring onions, sliced finely longitudinally and then chopped across finely
- Salt and Pepper

Method: Bring the vegetables to boil in well-salted water until soft and a fork will go ineasily. Drain and add the butter and pepper and onion while still hot. Then add the coconut cream and mash thoroughly. If still too dry add a little milk and mash again.

New road layout in place from Monday, 31 March

Starting Monday, 31 March, you'll notice a temporary change to the road layout at our entrance. For the next two weeks, a Stop/Go sign or traffic lights will be in place, adding a little extra excitement to your arrival!

A Kiwi in Pang

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At the age of 26 in 1966, restless and bored after two-and-a-half years teaching at Fairfield Primary School, Bev Andrews, as she was then, was accepted as one of five new teachers at a school in Pangnirtung on Baffin Island, off the east coast of Canada and 40km. from the Arctic Circle which cuts through the middle of the island. It is a land of mountains, icefields, fjords and glaciers with temperatures barely above 10C. in summer and plummeting to -40C. in winter.

The Inuit people were originally seminomadic hunters, highly dependent on seals for food and skins, but the more permanent Pang settlement was set up by the Hudson Bay company and the Royal Canadian Mounted Police as a trading post.

Bev describes her time teaching English to the Inuit children, enjoying their charm and humour and relates the problems of keeping warm, stocking up with food to last the winter, and the ferocity of the winter storms, when the school would close. She also gives an insight into the lifestyle, and unique crafts of the Inuit people.

Bev relates this extraordinary year in her young adult life with such freshness and enthusiasm that it makes a highly enjoyable read.

Malcolm. PS "Inuit" has replaced the term "Eskimo" across Alaska and the Arctic, although there were originally three large tribal groups.
