Closer to home, our latest vegetable garden is flourishing. Rows of potatoes promise new spuds for Christmas lunch, alongside corn, peas, and beans - a real feast in the making. The new maintenance shed is open, and the team couldn't be happier with their



upgraded space (and yes, they're already planning what new "toys" might fill it).

And for those partial to a bit of golf, the putting green and driving net boast breathtaking views over the maungas - just try not to send your ball into the bush, or it might be lost to nature

As the last of the road cones disappear and the cycleway and median strip take shape along Hamilton Road, it's clear that change is not just constant it's positive. Te Awa is growing, thriving, and looking to the future with pride.

Richard Johnstone - the Mailman

For many residents of Te Awa Lifecare, the sight of Richard Johnstone strolling through the village with a basket of letters has become a familiar and much-loved part of community life. Known affectionately as "The Mailman," Richard has been quietly keeping the wheels of communication turning for the past five years — ever since he and his wife, Kerry, moved into the Villas on the 1st of December.

When they first arrived, it was the late Grant Edgecumbe who was delivering the papers around the village. One day, Richard casually offered to take on the mail deliveries — and from that small gesture, a village tradition was born. Back then, Te Awa was home to only about 25 villas, six to eight cottages, and the Care Centre. It was a tidy little route, manageable and friendly. But as the village grew, so too did Richard's daily rounds.

Originally, mail delivery days were Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday – though the Saturday run was always something of a gamble, depending on when the mail actually arrived at the village! Still, come rain or shine, Richard was there – basket in hand and a ready smile for anyone he met along the way.

When Richard and Kerry headed off on holidays, two trusty stand-ins made sure the tradition carried on — a heartfelt thanks to Judy Gray and Marie Brown for keeping the mail moving. Their support meant residents never went long without their letters, parcels, and the occasional surprise envelope.

Sorting the mail became a well-

honed ritual for Richard. Up at the reception area, he'd lay everything out in the meeting room, dividing it into six categories: the Care Centre, the Cottages, and the three different Villa roads. Then, with precision and a touch of humour, he'd set off on his walk, delivering to each mailbox in turn. The route wasn't long, but on days when the monthly magazines arrived, the basket could get heavy! Still, Richard took it all in stride.

Over the years, he's seen just about every kind of envelope pass through his hands — from the ever-popular Te Whatu Ora letters to the occasional police infringement notice (no names mentioned, of course!). But more than the mail itself, it was the people that made the job special. Delivering letters meant Richard came to know everyone in the village — who lived where, who had newly moved in, and, sadly, who had passed on. His role was more than practical; it connected him deeply to the life and rhythm of the village.

Now, after five years of service, Richard has hung up his mailbag — but not his energy. These days, he's discovered a new passion for Pickleball and has found extra time to hit the tennis court too. His dedication, warmth, and good humour have left an indelible mark on the community. So, to Richard — thank you. For every envelope sorted, every heavy basket carried, and every friendly chat along the way. You've delivered more than just the mail — you've delivered connection, care, and community.

Mission Over the Moon

At 3pm on Thursday, 2nd October, Te Awa's wine and cheese enthusiasts were treated to a delightful afternoon of sampling Over the Moon cheeses (based in Putāruru) paired with selected wines from the Mission Vineyard (based in Napier).

Around ten years ago, Sue Arthur founded the Over the Moon Dairy, which quickly rose to prominence, winning an impressive 150 prizes at the New Zealand Cheese Awards. Representing Mission was Rachel Dennis, from New Zealand's oldest winery, established in Hawke's Bay in 1851 by French missionaries.

The pairings of wine and cheese were cleverly curated, guided by the principle that you don't match a strong cheese with a light wine. Both Sue and Rachel's introductions were informative, engaging, and entertaining. Popular matches included Truffle Camembert with Mission Merlot, Sheep Cheese with Pinot Noir, and Creamy Blue with Gewürztraminer.

Sue also outlined a proposal to supply monthly cheese orders for Te Awa residents – further details will be available soon from Tracy.

It was an enjoyable and well-presented session, and everyone left a little wiser (and perhaps a little fuller!). A big thank you to Tracy, Lorenzo, and Tucky from our staff, who helped ensure the event ran smoothly. – Malcolm
